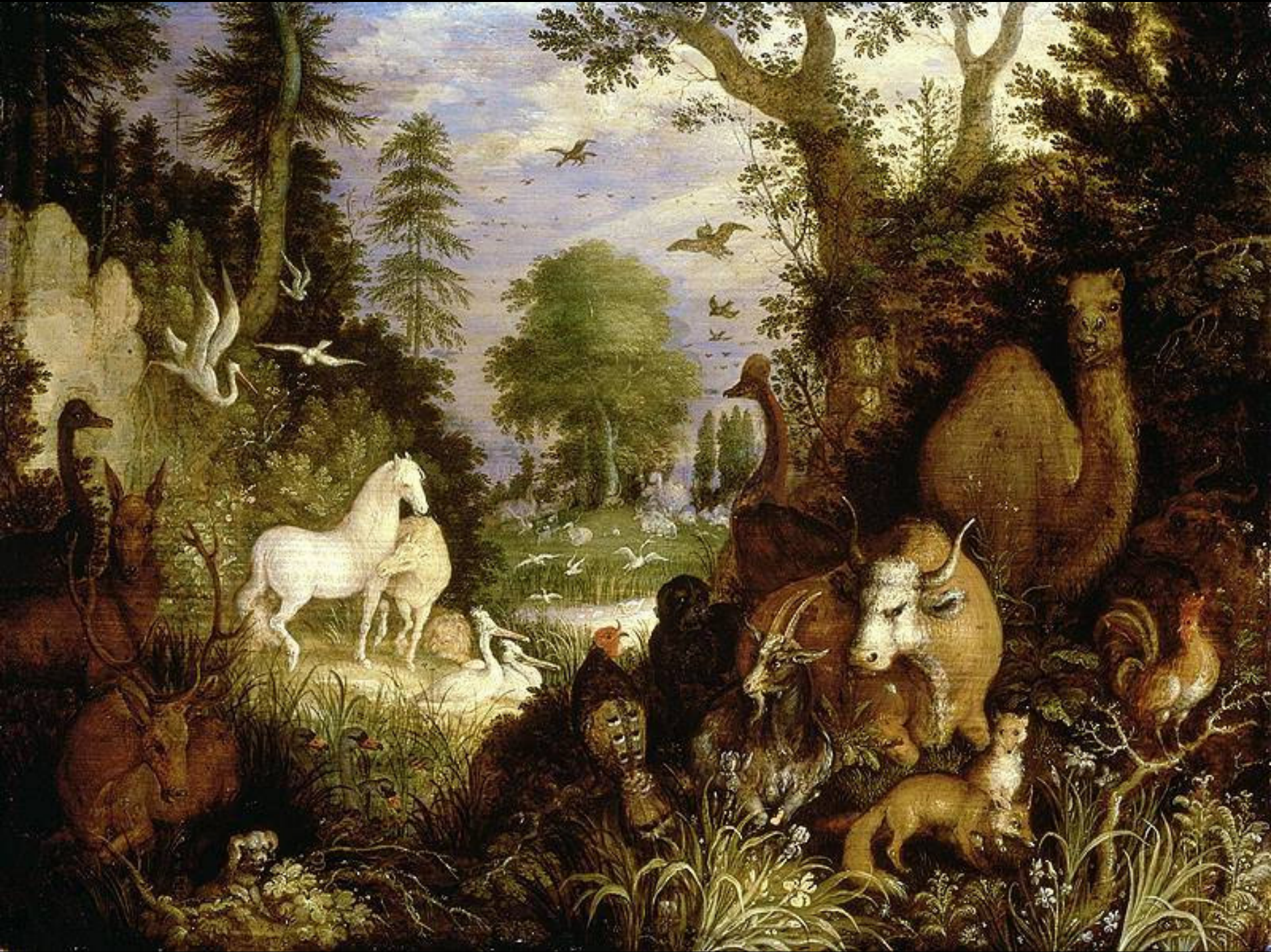

Genesis 3:1

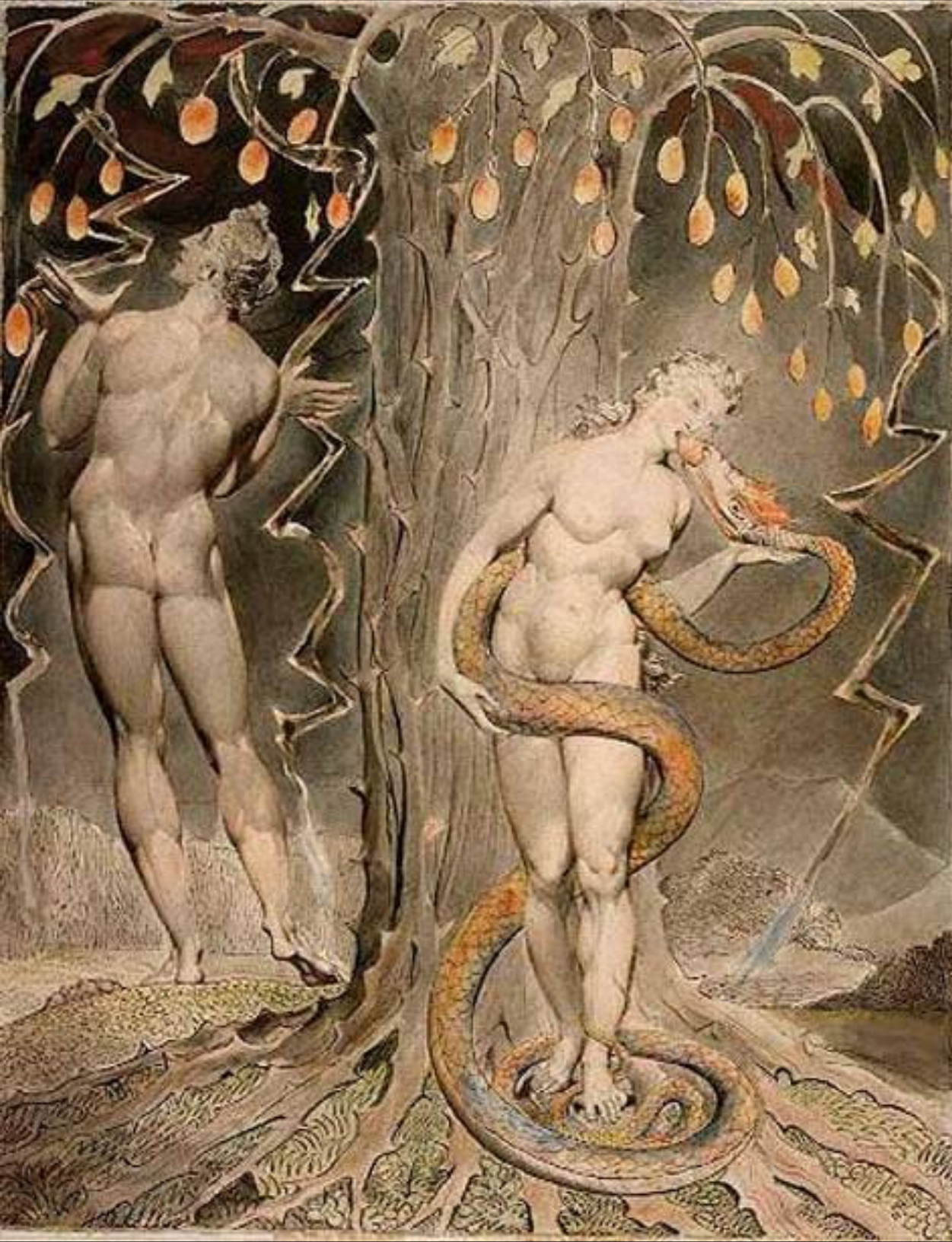

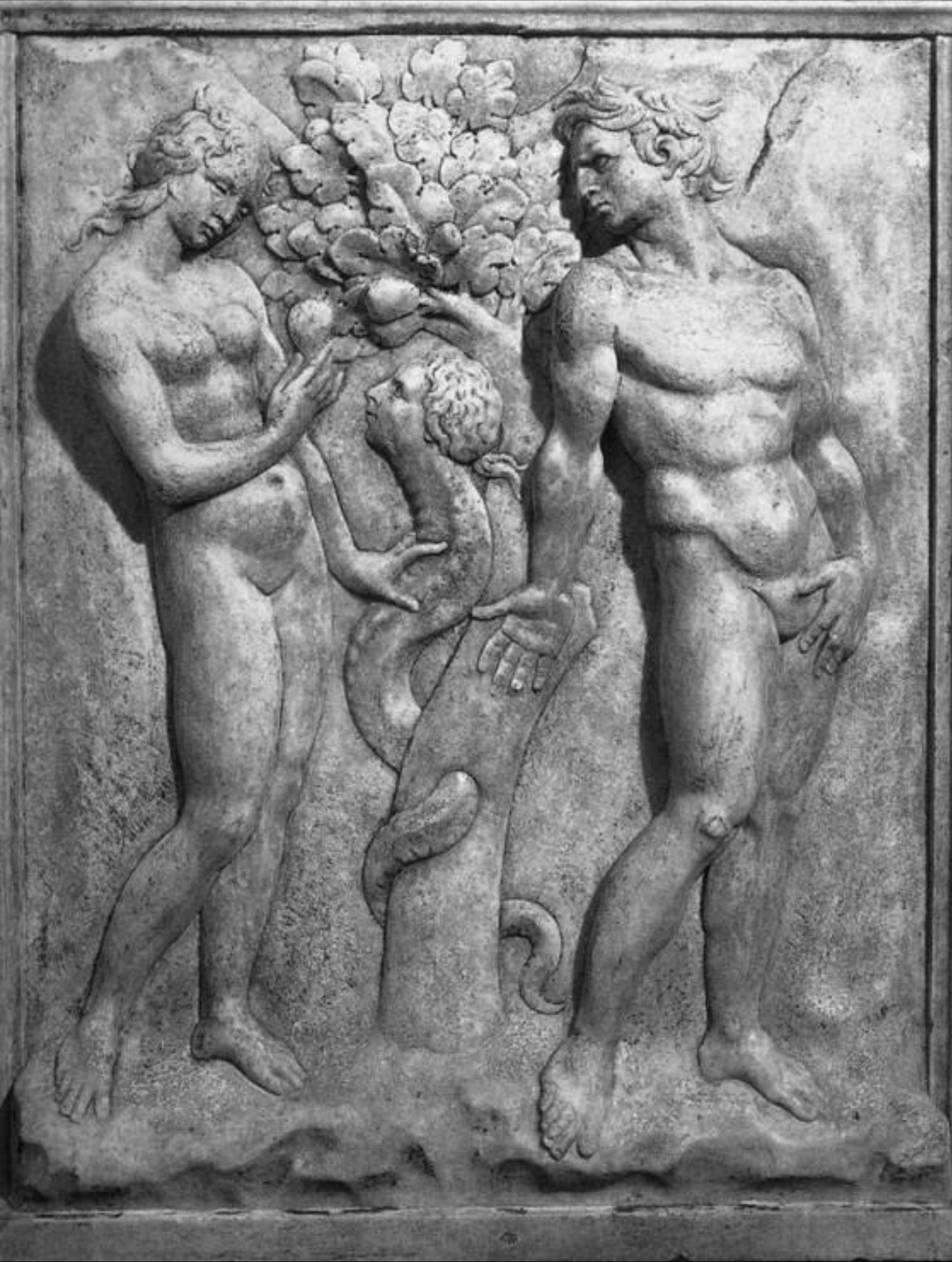

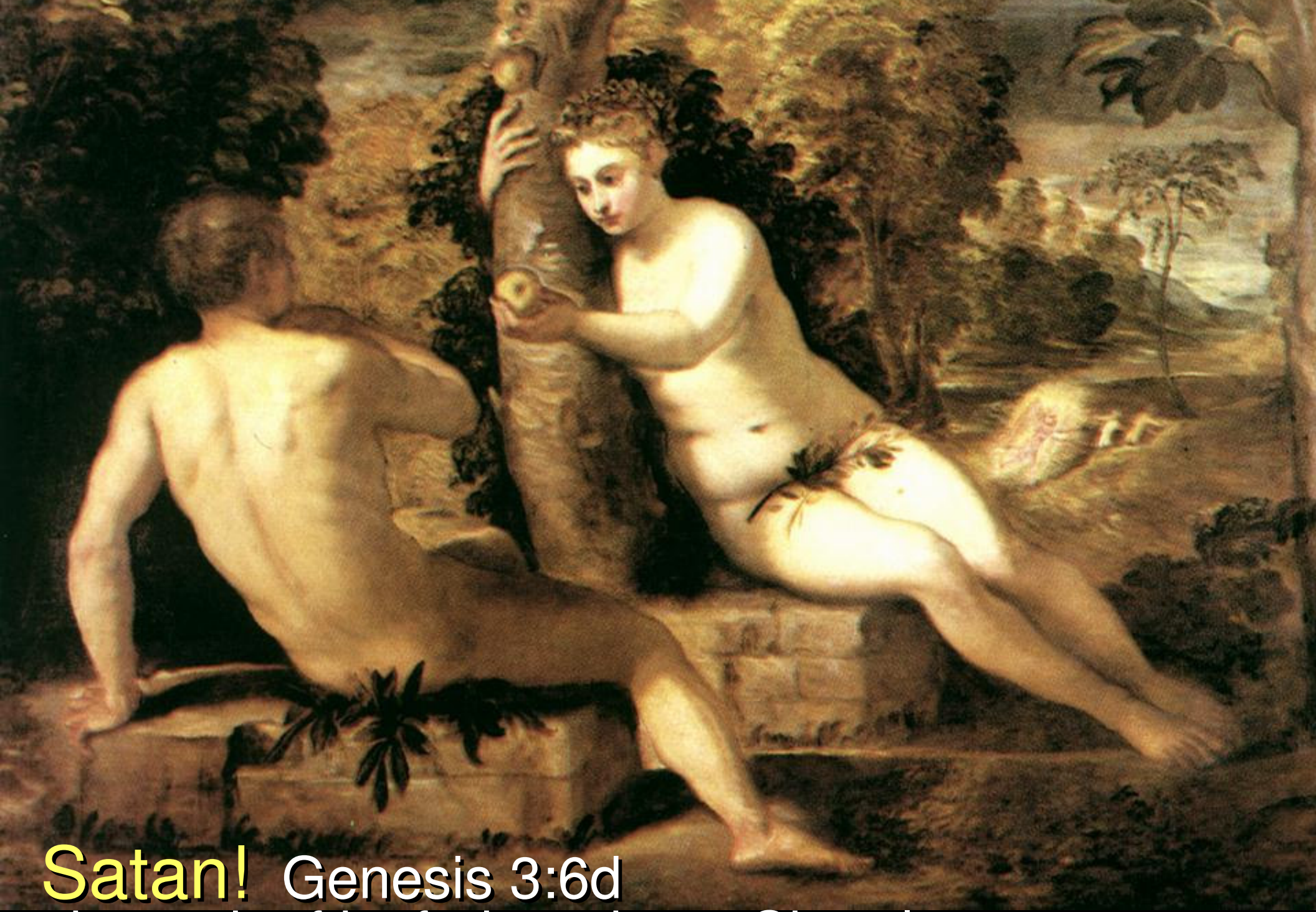
