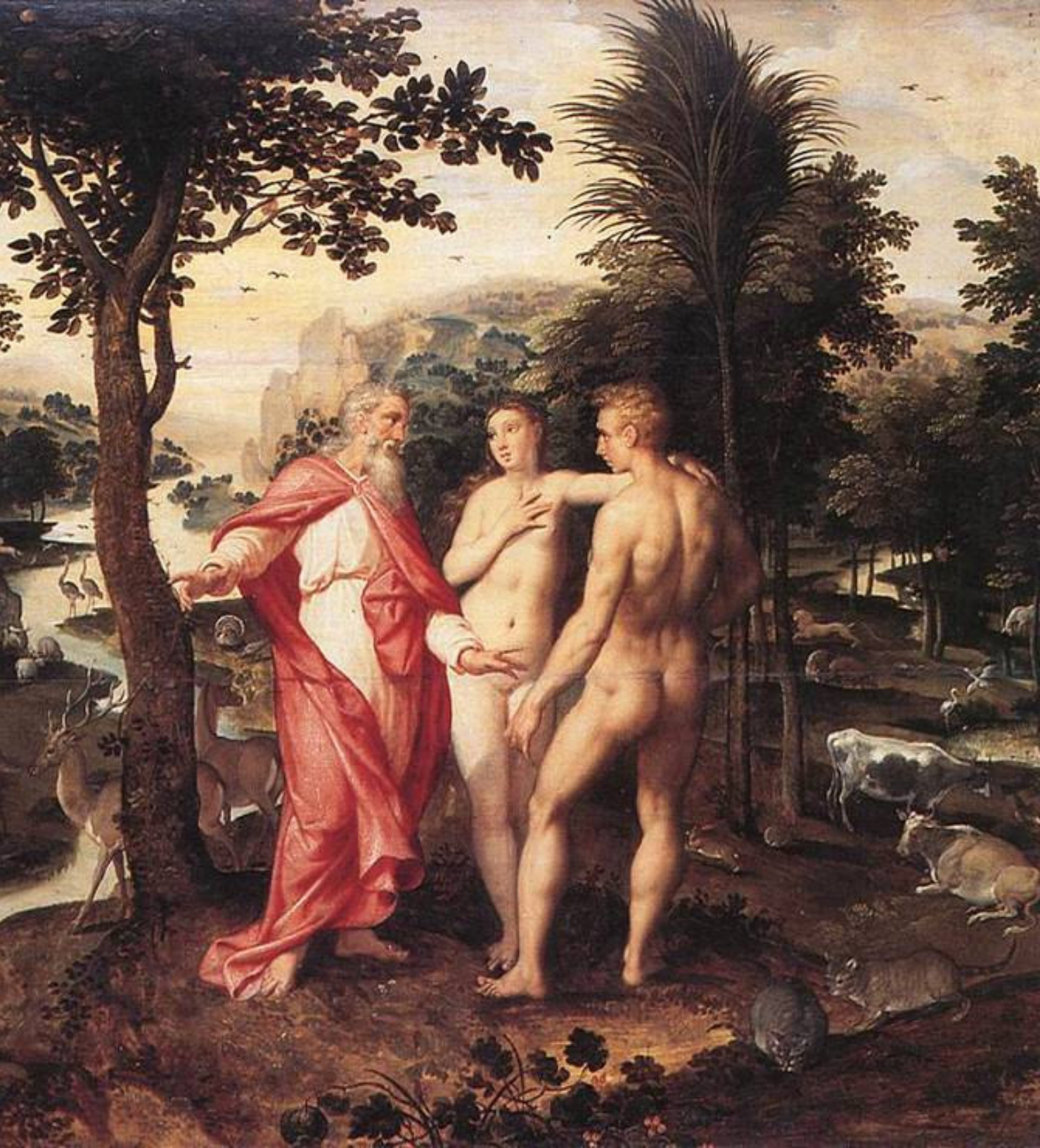

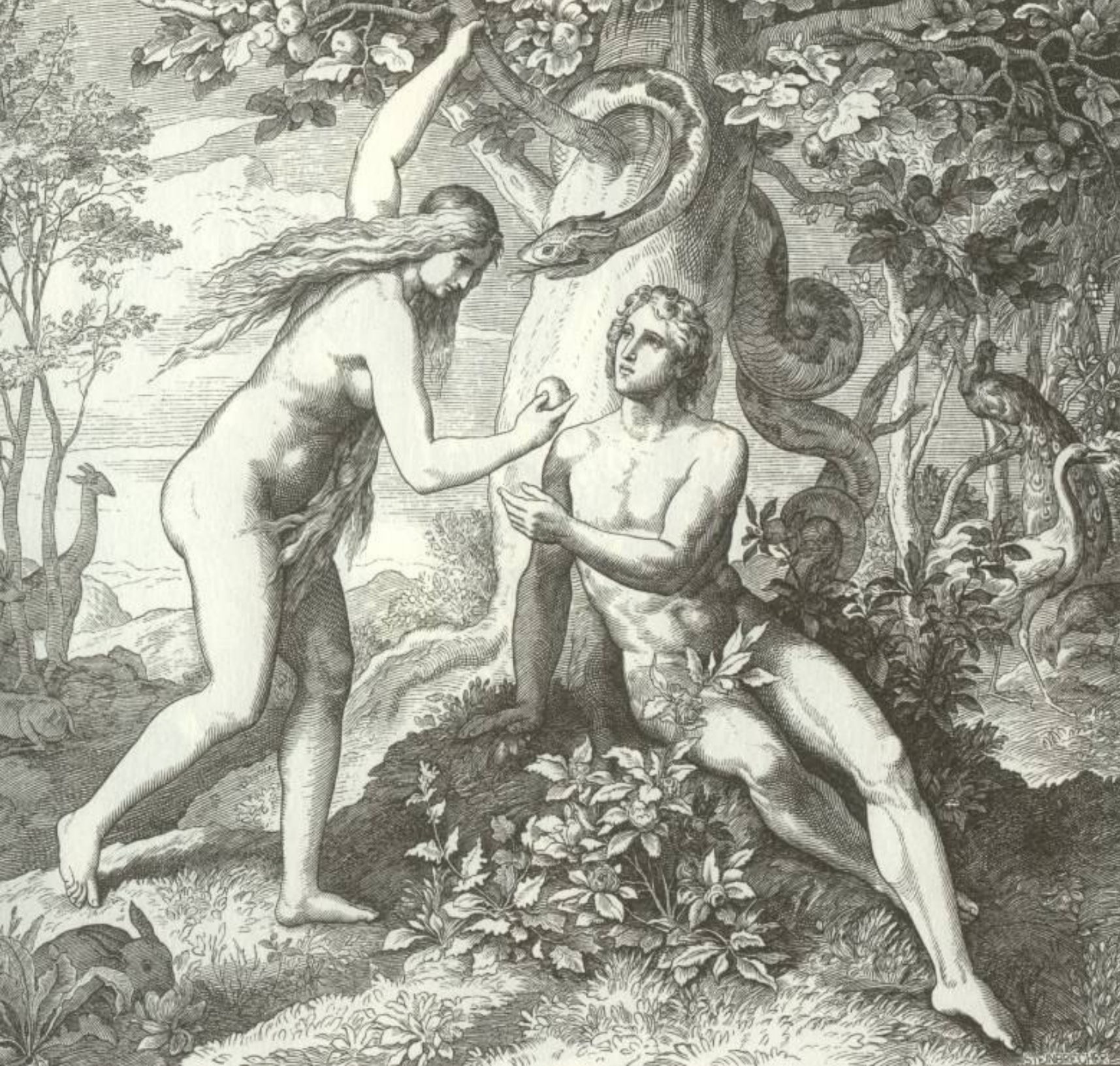

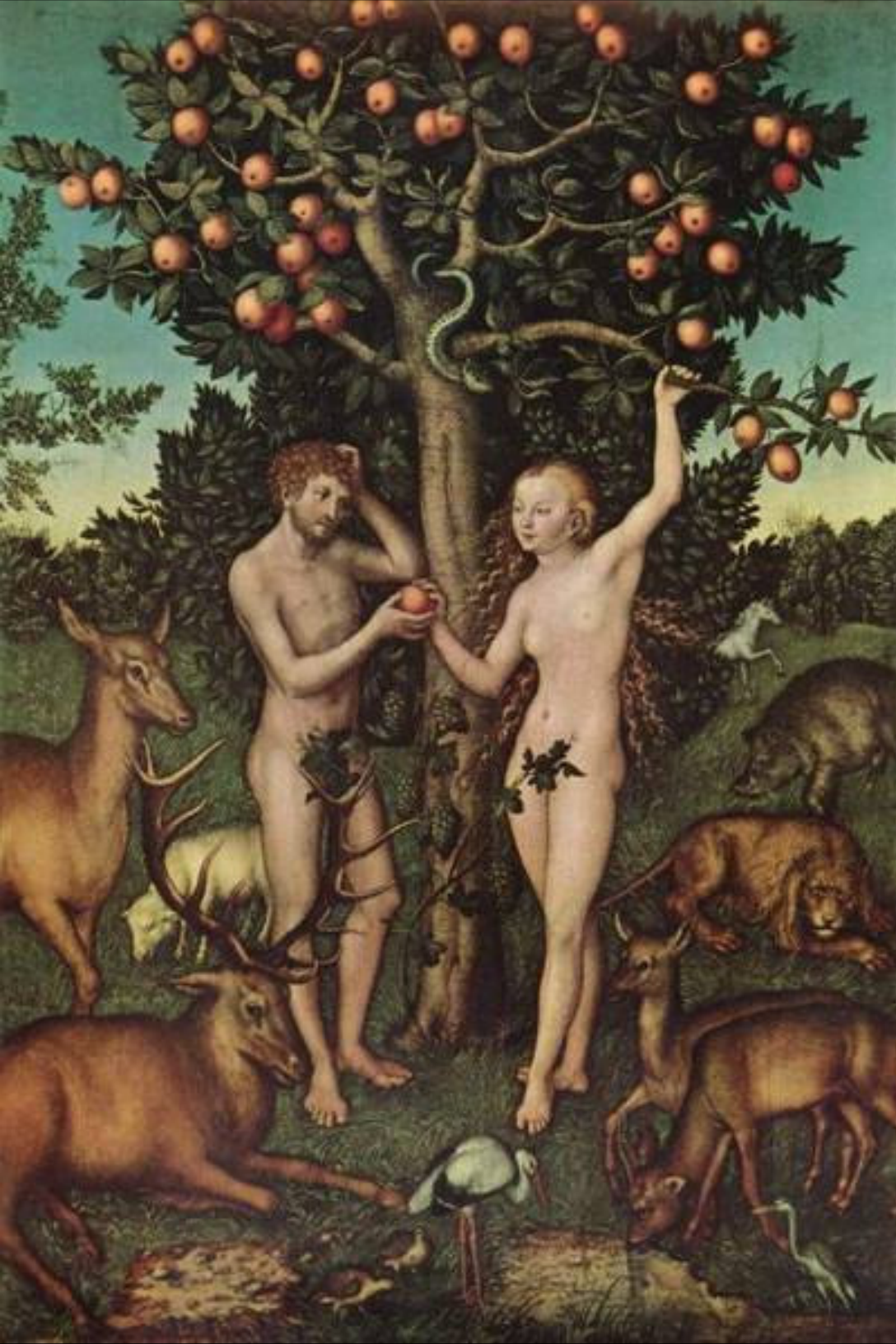

curse on the ground?

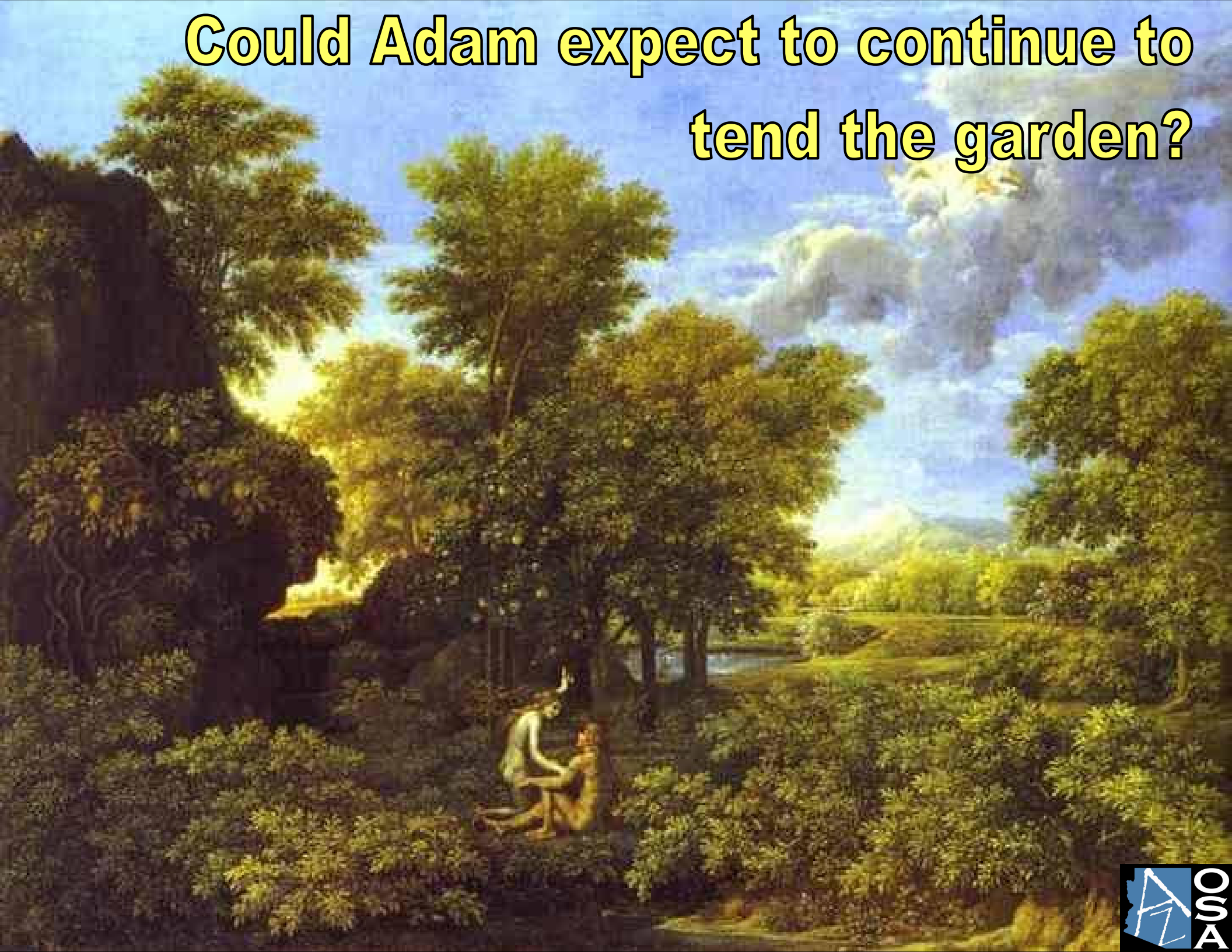




Genesis 3:18

tend the garden?**



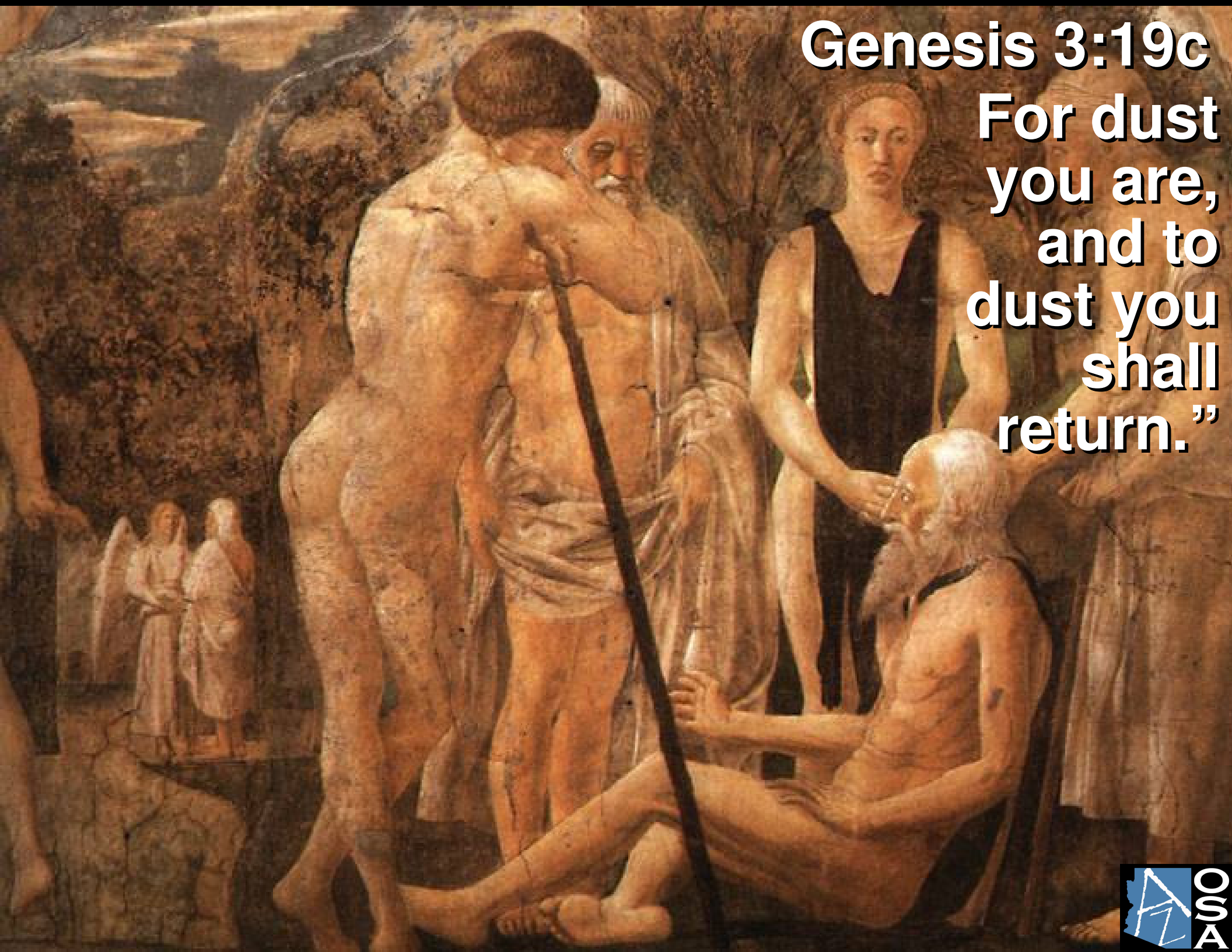
No! Genesis 3:19a “In the sweat of your face you shall eat bread till you return to the ground, ...

Genesis 3:20a
And Adam

Eve,...

Eve means “life”, and her name indicates Adam’s faith in God’s promise that the woman would bear a seed (Genesis 3:15).

Genesis 3:20b ... because she was the mother of all living.

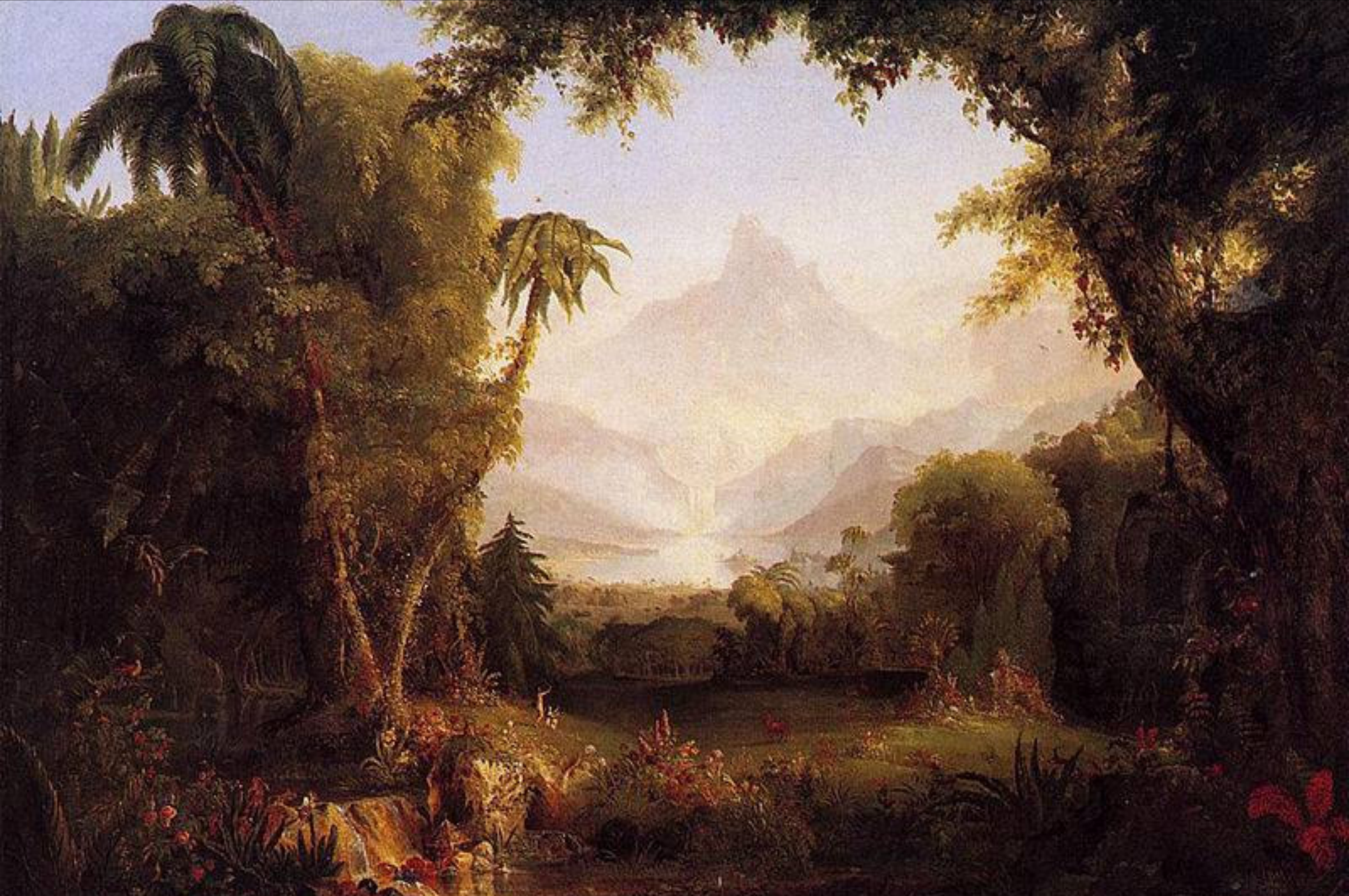




Were

No! Genesis 3:21 Also for Adam and his wife the Lord God made tunics of skin, and clothed them. **The first death.**





Why did God banish Adam and Eve from the Garden?

Genesis 3:22 Then the Lord God said, "Behold, the man has become like one of Us, to know good and evil. And now, lest

he put out his hand and take also of the tree of life, and eat, and live forever"-

(in his sinful, unredeemed state).
