Genesis 6:5 Then the Lord saw that the wickedness of man was great in the earth, and that every intent of the thoughts of his heart was only evil continually.

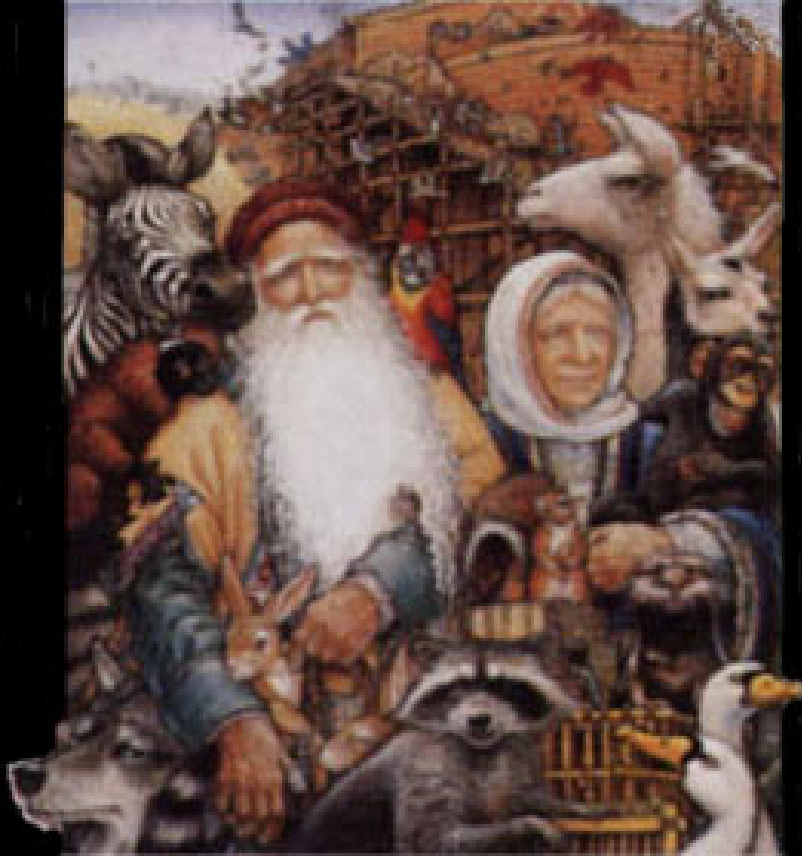

Was the Flood local, and did God promise to destroy man from the earth or with the earth?

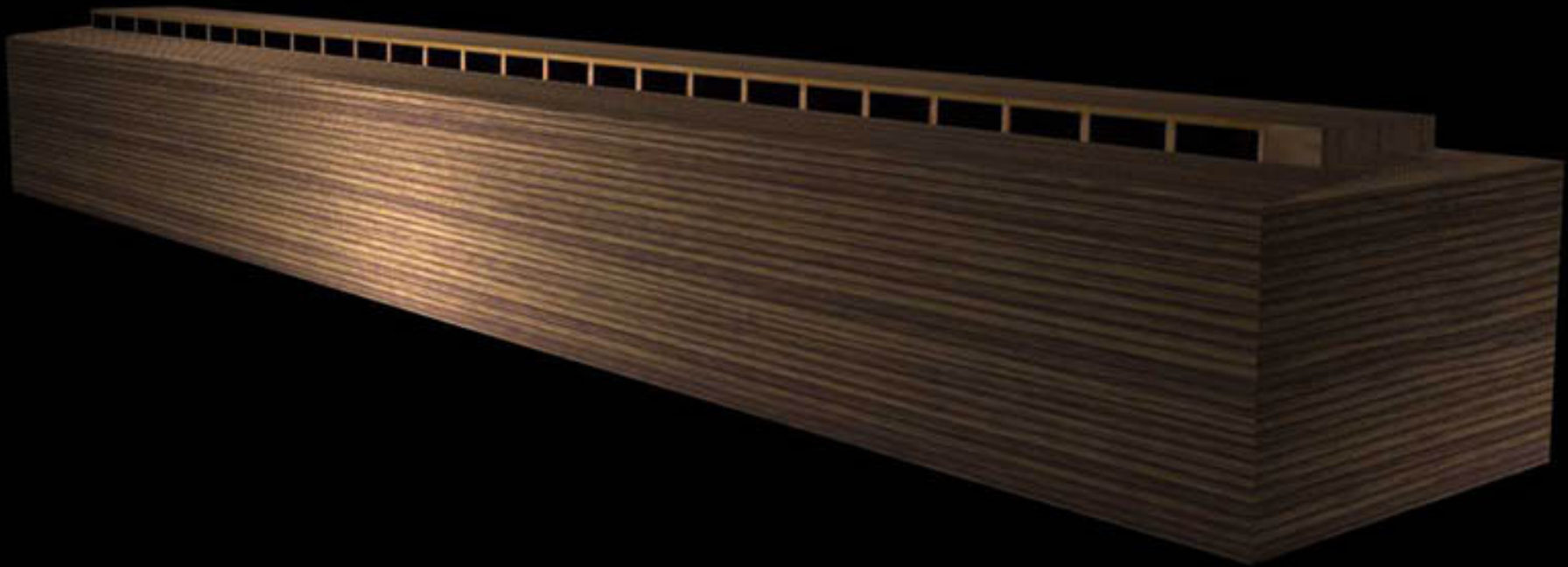


Genesis 6:13 And God said unto Noah,

and behold, I will destroy them with the earth.

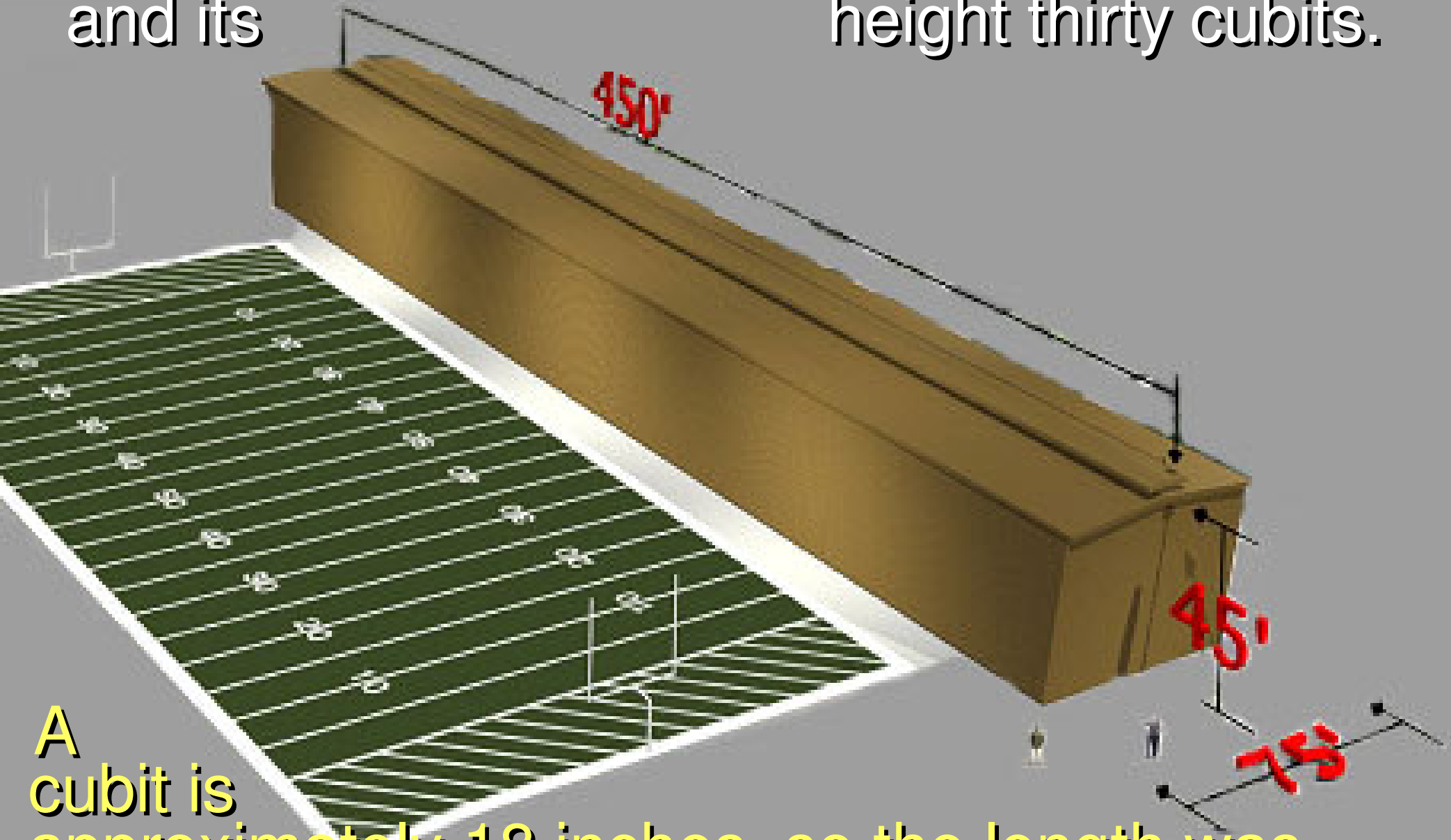


No, it

What was the size of the ark?

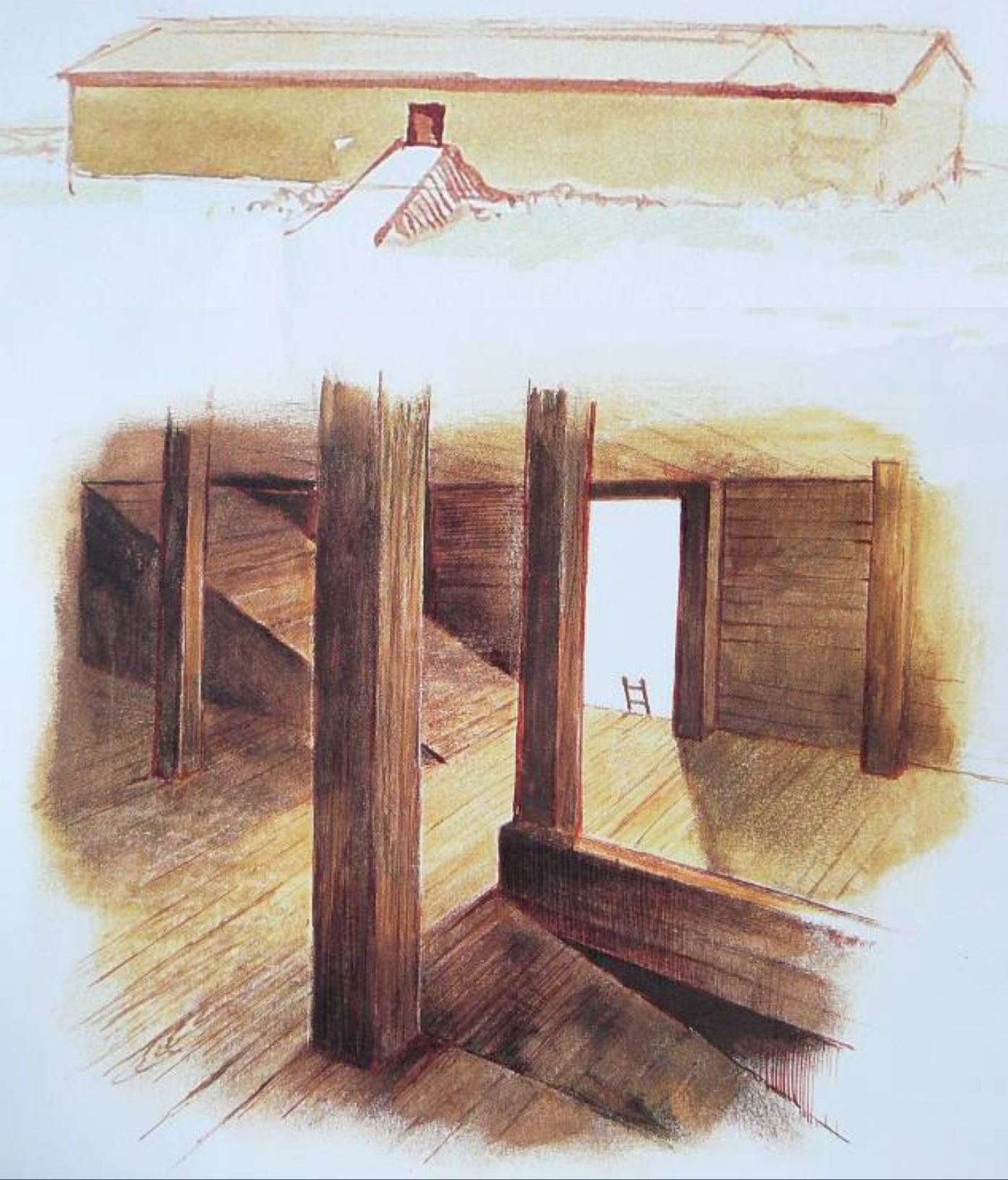


Genesis 6:15b The length of the ark shall be three hundred cubits, its width fifty cubits, and its height thirty cubits.



A cubit is approximately 18 inches, so the length was 450 feet, width 75 feet and height 45 feet.

Genesis 6:16

“You shall make a window for the ark, and you shall finish it to a cubit from above; and set the door of the ark in its side. You shall make it with lower, second and third decks.

wives with you.

Did every species need to be on the ark?



No! Genesis 6:19 “And of every living thing of all flesh you shall bring two of every *sort* into the ark, to keep *them* alive with you; they shall be male and female. **Sort refers to the cat kind, dog kind, horse kind, bear kind, whale kind and so on.**
